

BIOGRAPHY OF THE TRAINER


Sami Mustafa was born in Plemetina, Kosovo in 1984. He is an independent documentary director and producer, who in 2007 became one of the founders of Romawood production company. He initiated the Jekh Kham Jekh Sel (One Sun One Nation) project in 2007 and the well-known Rolling Film Festival, which has been running since 2009. He is a member of the International Romani Film Commission, the body responsible for fostering Roma cinema and filmmakers. Moreover, in his role as a film tutor he gives young Romani people the opportunity to learn how to express their lives, experiences and identities through artistic methods, and thus to produce documentary films. He is known for his first feature-length film, "Trapped by Law" (Kosovo/Germany), released in 2015.



Dr. Dezso Mate holds a Ph.D. in Interdisciplinary Sociology from Eötvös Loránd University and is a Research Fellow at Europa-Universität Flensburg and Visiting Research Fellow at Heidelberg University. He is a member of ERIAC's Barvalipe Academy and lectures at Södertörn University. His research interests encompass dimensions of intersectional and academic antigypsyism, structural racism, social movements, and resilience.


Dr. Carol Silverman is a cultural anthropologist and folklorist with over 40 years of research on Balkan and Romani music, politics, and identity. Her work critically examines representation, appropriation, and ethics in scholarship and cultural production, and she is the author of *Romani Routes* (Oxford, 2012) and *Ivo Papasov's Balkanology* (Bloomsbury, 2021).

BIOGRAPHY OF THE TRAINERS:

Dr. Maria Bogdan is a media and cultural theorist with a background in social sciences. Her research explores media representation, racism, cultural memory, and cultural trauma, with a focus on Roma. She earned her Ph.D. in Film, Media, and Culture Theory from Eötvös Loránd University in Budapest in 2018. A Fulbright alumna, she has been a Fortunoff Research Fellow at the Vienna Wiesenthal Institute for Holocaust Studies and the first Romani Rose Postdoctoral Research Fellow at Heidelberg University.

Stephen Naron, director of the Fortunoff Archive has worked as an archivist/librarian since 2003, when he received his MSIS from the University of Texas, Austin. Stephen pursued a Magister in Jewish studies/history at the Freie Universitaet Berlin and the Zentrum fuer Antisemitismusforschung, TU. Stephen is also responsible for spearheading initiatives such as preservation and digital access to the collection; cooperative projects with other testimony collections; oversight of fellowship and

research programs; and the production of the podcasts, ethnomusicological recordings, and the Archive's documentary film series



- Participants will reflect on how to shift from representing stereotypes to enabling agency

BIOGRAPHY OF THE TRAINER

Timea Junghaus is an art historian and contemporary art curator, as well as a leading voice in the Roma cultural and political movement. She is the Executive Director of the European Roma Institute for Arts and Culture (ERIAC) in Berlin. Her work explores the intersections of contemporary art, critical theory, and minority representation, with a focus on Roma art and heritage. Junghaus curated the first Roma Pavilion at the Venice Biennale (*Paradise Lost*, 2007), co-founded Gallery8 – Roma Contemporary Art Space in Budapest, and has led numerous international projects highlighting Roma resistance, voices, and creativity. In 2008, she received the Kairos Prize for her curatorial achievements.
